Movers & Shakers

Meet Liz Kochvar

Liz has been a familiar face around Rincon Country East since day one. Liz and husband George started coming to Tucson in 1971 to visit their son stationed at a missile silo. They spent their first three winters in Rincon Country Mobile Home Park. When George O'Leary opened the RV Resort, they moved over here, becoming "charter members" of the new park.

A real shaker and mover, it didn't take more than a couple of minutes for Liz to get involved in park activities. She played horseshoes for about ten years, but the kitchen was her domain for 25 years. She retired last year, but though still involved in some of the smaller events, says she has too much time on her hands and is bored.

That surely has to be a first for our Liz. Growing up on a farm in a family of eleven children, there was always work to be done. There were dishes to be washed. ("I stood on a box to wash dishes."), cows to be milked (by hand), a separator to be run ("I hated that one!"), butter to be made, and eggs to be collected. . . .

Liz learned to cook on a wood-burning cook stove. ("You always started the fire with corncobs.") Sometimes Liz's early cooking expeditions went a bit awry—like the first time she cooked rice. By the time she got done, all the pots in the house were full of rice. Even for a big family, two pounds of rice was a little much!

If there was a lull in activity there was always someone to join in a game of cards, a snowball fight, or any other activity they could dream up. Mostly they played outdoors. "We made our own fun," Liz recalls. "Back then there were no board games. We made our own playing cards from shoe boxes. A new pair of shoes meant more cards."

I tried to get Liz to tell me childhood stories involving her family of five boys and six girls.



She couldn't remember any specifics, but did say, "With eleven children there were a lot of escapades!"

Some of Liz's fond memories are of her Dad's first car—a Maxwell, going to school in a horse-drawn school bus, getting an indoor bathroom during her teen years, getting electricity, getting running water and the invention of Band-aids.

Liz graduated from high school and attended one year of tech school where she learned to electric weld. It was war time (WWII) and she wanted to do her part. She went to work for Pullman Standard making troop sleepers and Navy submarine housings.

At Pullman, master mechanic George Kochvar came into Liz's life. After the wedding, 20-year-old Liz became a stay-at-home mom until their youngest son was in sixth grade. She started out as a school volunteer, substitute taught for three years, then taught K-3 Special Ed for nine years. "A real challenge," said Liz, "But there were also many funny incidents. One day I turned around and saw a little girl dancing stark naked on a shelf in front of a window."

George and Liz's 43-year marriage produced four children—2 boys and 2 girls, 9 grandchildren, 8 great grandchildren and 2 great great grandchildren. George died of heart disease in 1984. Sadly, one of Liz's daughters died this November. It's very hard for a parent to lose a child. Aren't we parents supposed to go first? So when you see Liz, give her a hug and tell her you love her—if she'll stand still long enough for you to do it!

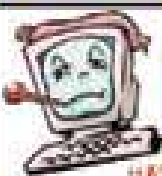
