Norma Weaver

“Newsletter Norma” puts her fingers to work every month collating the RCE “Villager” when it comes back from the printers. Over the years, Mary Morcom, Marcia Herdman and now Jim Dennis have been her happy helpers.

Norma was born in 1925 in Anchorage, Alaska. Her maternal grandparents went up for the Gold Rush and settled there. Her mother grew up and married there, but after four children, her parents divorced. Her mother then married a commercial fisherman, and the family moved to Juneau where Norma attended school for 10 years.

When Norma was 16, her mother moved away and left the family. Norma finished the school year in Juneau, then joined her mother in Forks, Washington.

After her high school graduation, Norma was sent to live with her father in Battle Creek, Michigan. She moved around with him and his wife for six years until she met this guy “who was bumming around the country.” Six months later the star-struck duo married and moved to Seattle where Chuck worked for Union Pacific. The year was 1950.

One year later Chuck answered an ad for a brakeman on the Alaska railroad. That meant four years in Seward where their first two children were born.

Chuck’s next stint was a forced assignment to Fairbanks, “which was wonderful in the summer and dreadful in the winter.” After getting hurt in a train derailment, Chuck was off work for a few years, so the two took to winter travel to escape the cold. Their third child was born in Poplar Bluffs, Missouri, where the couple lived for almost a year.

In 1959, with three kids, a dog and a parakeet, the Weavers drove the AlCan highway to Seward. The big Alaska earthquake of 1964 again put Chuck out of work. Then In 1965 he got a job with the Alaska Marine Highway System. His boat went to Seward, Kodiak, Homer, as well as other ports.



After retiring in the mid-70s, Chuck and Norma caught the travel bug. The kids were all off on their own, so the pair sold their house, bought a 40-foot 5th-wheel and hit the road. In 1978 the Weavers wintered next door at George O’Leary’s Rincon Country Mobile Home Park. There was an RV section at the time.

Chuck and Norma were part of the group that agreed to pay three years in advance and move into George’s new RV Resort on November 10, 1979. The day they moved, the electricity to their lot wasn’t hooked up yet. Norma commented, “You’d better get it on if my husband is going to watch a football game tonight.” No problem, George and his crew came through.

The Weavers stayed at RCE year-round with one exception—a trip to Alaska. After the flood of 1983 they bought a Park Model.

Chuck died in January 1987. Norma chose to stay. She says RCE is a wonderful place for singles. Early on she learned several crafts, including macrame and calligraphy. In fact, she used to hand print the activity tickets. Another woman put little designs on them. A couple of years ago Norma took over RCE’s after-hours phone-answering service.

If you know Norma even a little, you know she is always early for every event. There’s a story behind this fact (quirk?). If you want to know the details, you’ll have to ask Norma. She’ll be more than happy to explain.

This “man about the Park” may be both the most visible and the most invisible person at RCE. As Head Maintenance Man, he seems to be here, there and everywhere in a matter of minutes.

Look up, you might see him operating the boom for trimming palm trees. Look down the street and he might be cutting up dead palms or running the back hoe (when he can get it away from George!). Go by any park model and he might be looking at an electrical or plumbing problem.

Luis and his crew have also been working on getting the new golf cage finished. Ninety percent of the work in RCE is done by Luis and his small staff. Only 10% of the workload is technical help from outside.

There have been many comments on how beautiful the park is this year. Luis, of course, is in charge of all of it, including the flowers. “We follow a plan drawn up by George with modifications each year.”

As for maintaining the grass, Luis says the goal is to keep it “Ireland green.” When George hired him seven years ago, that became the catch phrase for meeting his Irish boss’ expectations.

When he was hired on, people warned him the job wouldn’t last more than two years. Luis is happy to prove them wrong. He enjoys his job and his crew whose job it is to keep RCE looking nice. Over time he has gotten to know and enjoy George not only as a boss, but as a person.

Before coming to RCE Luis worked at Davis Monthan installing fiber optic. How he got to RCE is due to his wife. “When an add appeared in the Tucson newspaper,” Luis says, “she dragged him to the West Park and almost pushed me out of the car to get an application. I wanted nothing to do with senior citizens.” Funny thing, he’s ended up loving every minute of working with us old folks.

Luis says, “Every day is different. That makes it



fun. At the end of each day it makes me proud to have made a difference.”

Summer, Luis says, is a time to maintain that “Irish green,” clean up from the monsoons and do special “George” projects such as RCE upgrades.

Not one to sit still and stagnate in his job, Luis took a college course this past year and became heating and cooling certified. He is always available to give advice on problems we encounter in that arena. He says, “I’m open to any challenge if it’s within my capabilities.”

Luis was born in Nogales—on the Mexico side. He is the eldest of six, including two sisters and three brothers. One sister has passed away.

When he was 12 or 13 his family moved to Tucson. Luis graduated from Sunnyside High in 1997. Growing up, his favorite sport was basketball. His passion, however, was auto body repair and modification. It seems that fixing things is in his blood.

Right after high school, Luis met and fell in love with Blanca. They will celebrate their 9th anniversary on April 10. Their three kids, ages 13, 10 and 2, keep them hopping.

Having Luis has been good for the park. When you see him, be sure and let him know how much you appreciate him. Everyone likes to hear a heartfelt thank you now and then.
