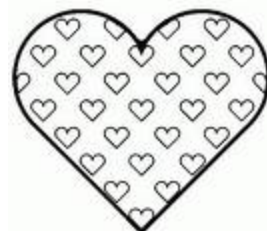

# John & Connie Ross

The subjects of this article are two very unique and interesting Rincon County West RV Resort residents - John and Connie Ross. John and Connie have been married for 54 years, have two daughters and six granddaughters. John is from Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, and Connie is from Scenery Hill, Pennsylvania. They met in church. While Connie was in high school, John was serving in the US Army in Germany from 1953 - 55 with the Drum and Bugle Corps.

After discharge from the Army, John went to work for the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation as a welder while going to night school at Geneva College, from which he graduated in 1962 with degrees in History and Social Studies, as well as a teaching credential. In 1963, John started his long career in education as a teacher and, later, as an administrator.

His first teaching job was at the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) School in Pine Ridge, South Dakota in 1963. Pine Ridge was both a day school and a boarding school. John and Connie found themselves in a culture that they were not accustomed to. The children who attended the school were of the Oglala Lakota Sioux tribe of the Sioux Nation. (Most of us are more familiar with a resident of Pine Ridge known as Chief Red Cloud and the neighboring community of Wounded Knee.) The children were for the most part quiet and soft spoken. They spoke their ethnic language and were a challenge to teach in English. It took a long time for John and Connie to be accepted into the community. John and Connie were often foster parents to school children in need of parenting.

In those days the teachers at Pine Ridge were not of Indian descent. The teachers all became very close and John and Connie encountered a practice with which they had previously been unfamiliar - pot luck. Connie hired several of the girl students to do various household chores to teach them domestic skills, and to pay them so they would have spending money - something in short supply. In addition, Connie made layettes for children born

in the local hospital. They were very involved in their community and their church. During this time John was working on his Masters Degree in Secondary Education Administration, which he completed in 1971. John & Connie have many interesting stories of their 18 years at Pine Ridge. With John's Masters Degree in hand they moved to Casa Grande, AZ. During that time the Ross girls had grown and were off to college, so Connie went to work first as a school secretary then as a legal secretary.

Later, Connie decided that since her husband and daughters had college degrees, and she did not, she would make a change. She attended Pima Community College for two years and her grades were so good that she attended University of Arizona on a full scholarship, where she received a BS in Family Studies and Psychology. John points out that Connie received one B in her four years — all other grades were A's.

In 1980, John started teaching at what was then known as the Papago Indian Reservation in Sells, AZ - now known as the Tohono O'odham Nation. John commuted from Casa Grande to Sells daily, a distance of about 80 miles each way. John worked at the reservation school - first as a teacher, then as Business Manager, and finally as the Administrative Officer, until his retirement in 1986.

John & Connie had visited friends at RCW, liked what they saw and, in 1989, moved here, and this has been their home since. Connie worked in the RCW office for a few years and you have seen John's smiling face in many locations. In 2000 Connie's sister moved here. Her sister is Carol Bucenell, our very efficient and friendly Post Mis-

dress. Thank you Connie for bringing her to us. They have remained very active in their local church, Christ Community Church near Pantano where John is a Community Group Teacher for Bible Study.

### Medical News You Can Use

#### WALKING MAY STAVE OFF MEMORY LOSS IN ELDERLY

Walking a mile a day could keep memory loss and Alzheimer's disease at bay, a new research has claimed.

Researchers at the University of Pittsburgh found that men and women who walk at least six miles (about 9.5 km) a week are mentally sharper in later life than those who don't walk much. Our brains, according to the researchers, decrease in size as we age, but regular exercise may protect it in later life and could cut the risks of memory problems by half.

For their study, the team studied 299 dementia free elderly individuals and recorded the distance they walked each week. For nine years, brain scans were carried out to measure their brain size, and four years further on they were tested for cognitive impairment. It was found that those who walked at least six to nine miles each week had greater grey matter at the nine year point than those who walked shorter distances. Greater distances did not appear to have any further effect.

Four years later, 116 of the participants, or 40 per cent, were suffering some form of dementia. But those who had walked the most had cut their risk of developing memory problems in half. Kirk Erickson, who led the study, said: "Brain size shrinks in late adulthood, which can cause memory problems. Our results should encourage well-designed trials of physical exercise in older adults as a promising approach for preventing dementia and Alzheimer's disease. If regular exercise in mid-life could improve brain health and improve thinking and memory in later life, it would be one more reason to make regular exercise in people of all ages a public health imperative." The new research is published in the medical journal, *Neurology*.

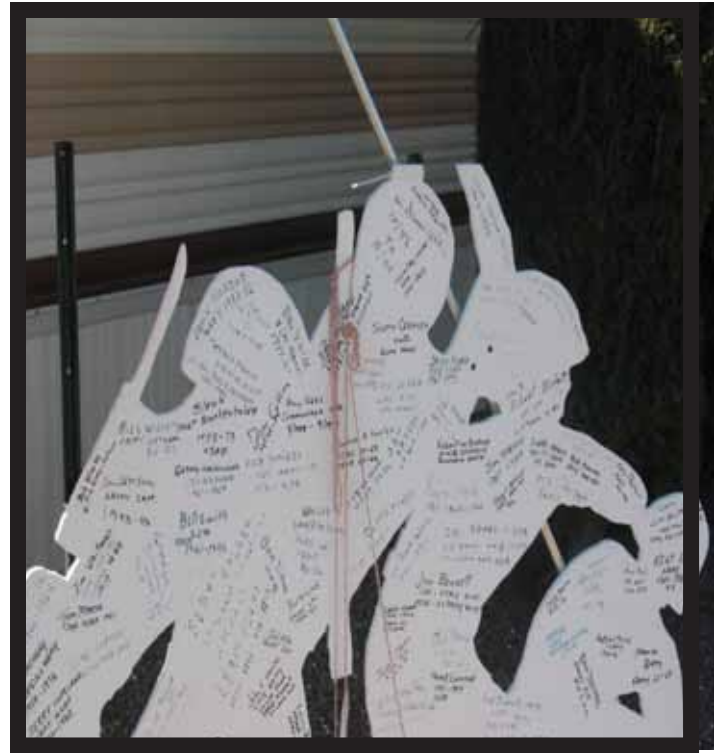
